## 24. Jehoshaphat

So <u>Jehoshaphat</u> reigned over Judah. He was thirty-five years old when he became king of Judah, and he reigned in Jerusalem twenty-five years. His mother's name was <u>Azubah</u> daughter of Shilhi. He walked in the ways of his father Asa and did not stray from them; he did what was right in the eyes of the LORD. The <u>high places</u>, however, were not <u>removed</u>, and the people still had not set their <u>hearts</u> on the God of their fathers.

The other events of Jehoshaphat's <u>reign</u>, from beginning to end, are <u>written</u> in the <u>annals</u> of Jehu son of <u>Hanani</u>, which are <u>recorded</u> in the book of the kings of Israel.

Later, Jehoshaphat king of Judah made an <u>alliance</u> with Ahaziah king of Israel, who was <u>guilty</u> of wickedness. He <u>agreed</u> with him to construct a <u>fleet</u> of trading ships. After these were built at Ezion Geber, Eliezer son of Dodavahu of Mareshah prophesied against Jehoshaphat, saying, "Because you have made an alliance with <u>Ahaziah</u>, the LORD will destroy what you have made." The <u>ships</u> were <u>wrecked</u> and were not able to set <u>sail</u> to <u>trade</u>. (2 Chroniclkes 20:31-37 NIV)

When Jehoshaphat died, he was buried with his <u>ancestors</u> in the City of David. Then his son <u>Jehoram</u> became the next king. Jehoram's brothers--the other sons of Jehoshaphat--were Azariah, Jehiel, Zechariah, Azariahu, Michael, and Shephatiah. Their father had given each of them valuable gifts of silver, gold, and <u>costly</u> items, and also the <u>ownership</u> of some of Judah's fortified cities. However, Jehoram became king because he was the <u>oldest</u>. But when Jehoram had become <u>solidly</u> established as king, he killed all his brothers and some of the other leaders of Israel.

Jehoram was thirty-two years old when he became king, and he reigned in Jerusalem eight years. But Jehoram followed the example of the kings of Israel and was as wicked as King Ahab, for he had married one of Ahab's daughters. So Jehoram did what was evil in the LORD's sight. But the LORD was not willing to <u>destroy</u> David's <u>dynasty</u>, for he had made a covenant with David and promised that his descendants would continue to <u>rule</u> forever. (2 Chronicles 21:1-7 NLT)
