## 50. Abraham – Romans

Is this <u>blessedness</u> only for the <u>circumcised</u>, or also for the uncircumcised? We have been saying that Abraham's <u>faith</u> was <u>credited</u> to him as <u>righteousness</u>. Under what <u>circumstances</u> was it credited? Was it after he was circumcised, or <u>before</u>? It was not after, but before! And he received the sign of circumcision, a <u>seal</u> of the righteousness that he had by faith while he was <u>still</u> uncircumcised. So then, he is the father of all who believe but have not been circumcised, in order that righteousness might be credited to them. And he is also the father of the circumcised who not only are circumcised but who also <u>walk</u> in the <u>footsteps</u> of the faith that our father Abraham had before he was circumcised.

It was not through law that Abraham and his offspring received the <u>promise</u> that he would be <u>heir</u> of the world, but through the righteousness that comes by faith. For if those who live by law are heirs, faith has no <u>value</u> and the promise is <u>worthless</u>, because law <u>brings wrath</u>. And where there is no <u>law</u> there is no <u>transgression</u>.

Therefore, the promise comes by faith, so that it may be by grace and may be <u>guaranteed</u> to all Abraham's offspring—not only to those who are of the law but also to those who are of the faith of Abraham. He is the father of us all. As it is written: "I have made you a father of <u>many nations</u>." He is our father in the <u>sight</u> of God, in whom he believed—the God who gives life to the <u>dead</u> and <u>calls</u> things that are not as though they were.

Against all hope, Abraham in hope believed and so became the father of many nations, just as it had been said to him, "So shall your offspring be." Without weakening in his faith, he <u>faced</u> the fact that his body was as good as dead–since he was about a hundred years old–and that Sarah's womb was also dead. Yet he did not waver through unbelief <u>regarding</u> the promise of God, but was <u>strengthened</u> in his faith and gave glory to God, being fully persuaded that God had power to do what he had promised. This is why "it was credited to him as righteousness." The words "it was credited to him" were written not for him <u>alone</u>, but also for us, to whom God will credit righteousness—for us who believe in him who <u>raised</u> Jesus our Lord from the dead. He was delivered over to death for our sins and was raised to <u>life</u> for our justification. (Romans 4:9-25 NIV)
