## 23. Naomi

In the days when the <u>judges</u> ruled, there was a <u>famine</u> in the land, and a man from <u>Bethlehem</u> in Judah, together with his wife and two sons, went to live for a while in the country of <u>Moab</u>. The man's name was <u>Elimelech</u>, his wife's name <u>Naomi</u>, and the names of his two sons were <u>Mahlon</u> and <u>Kilion</u>. They were <u>Ephrathites</u> from Bethlehem, Judah. And they went to Moab and lived there. Now Elimelech, Naomi's husband, died, and she was left with her two sons. <sup>4</sup>They married Moabite women, one named <u>Orpah</u> and the other <u>Ruth</u>. After they had lived there about ten years, both Mahlon and Kilion also died, and Naomi was left without her two sons and her husband...

When she heard in Moab that the LORD had come to the aid of his people by providing food for them, Naomi and her daughters-in-law prepared to return home from there. Then Naomi said to her two daughters-in-law, "Go back, each of you, to your mother's home. May the LORD show kindness to you, as you have shown to your dead and to me...

At this they <u>wept</u> again. Then Orpah kissed her mother-in-law good-by, but Ruth <u>clung</u> to her ... So the two women went on <u>until</u> they came to Bethlehem. When they arrived in Bethlehem, the whole town was <u>stirred</u> because of them, and the women exclaimed, "Can this be Naomi?"

"Don't call me Naomi," she told them. "Call me <u>Mara</u>, because the Almighty has made my life very <u>bitter</u>. I went away full, but the LORD has brought me back <u>empty</u>. Why call me Naomi? The LORD has afflicted me; the Almighty has brought misfortune upon me."

So Naomi returned from Moab accompanied by Ruth the Moabitess, her daughter-inlaw, arriving in Bethlehem as the <u>barley harvest</u> was beginning...

Now Naomi had a relative on her husband's side, from the clan of Elimelech, a man of standing, whose name was Boaz...

Boaz replied, "I've been told all about what you have done for your mother-in-law since the <u>death</u> of your husband—how you left your father and mother and your homeland and came to live with a people you did not know before.

"The LORD bless him!" Naomi said to her daughter-in-law. "He has not stopped showing his kindness to the living and the dead." She added, "That man is our close relative; he is one of our kinsman-redeemers."

One day Naomi her mother-in-law said to her, "My daughter, should I not try to find a home for you, where you will be well provided for?

Stay here for the night, and in the morning if he wants to <u>redeem</u>, good; let him redeem. But if he is not willing, as <u>surely</u> as the LORD lives I will do it. Lie here until morning." ... When Ruth came to her mother-in-law, Naomi asked, "How did it go, my daughter?" ...
